- **The Martingale System:** A classic progressive wagering method where a gamer doubles their bet after every loss, attempting to recuperate all previous losses plus an earnings when they lastly win. This requires an enormous bankroll and typically hits table or website limitations during a losing streak.
- **The Anti-Martingale (Paroli) System:** Players double their bets after a *win* rather than a loss, attempting to take advantage of winning streaks while decreasing damage during cold runs.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for extended streaks of low crashes (e.g., numerous rounds under 1.50 x) and wagering high up on a perceived "high multiplier" coming quickly. (Note: This succumbs to the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent event).
