The outside conditions are classified into five distinct tiers:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look pristine even at greater float worths, while others look heavily damaged. In addition, specific high-tier knives and weapon patterns are heavily affected by "Pattern Templates," making specific variations extremely unusual and valuable to collectors.
