Techniques for CS2 Case Battles

- **Budget Battles:** Opening high-quantity, low-priced cases (like *Prisma* or *Recoil* cases) results in longer battles with numerous rounds, smoothing out the variation somewhat.
- **High-Roller Battles:** Opening expensive cases (like older weapon collections or souvenir-adjacent cases) leads to high-variance, high-risk matches where a single knife drop decides the entire lobby.

3. Playing Reverse/Terminal Modes

If a player notifications that standard battles are yielding poor luck, switching to "Lowest Wins" mode can be an intriguing tactical shift, though it still relies greatly on statistical variance instead of skill.
