

If you invest any time around flight training, you start seeing a basic pattern. Numbers do not simply "happen" at a school, they relocate through a system. Applications become cohorts, mates become training stages, and phases turn into graduates. AELO Swiss Academy, based in Locarno at the airport terminal area, is an excellent case study for just how that system can be read from a few public signals.

From the reporting around AELO's step and rebrand, we understand a number of concrete anchors. AELO is the rebranded follower to Aero Locarno. In February 2024, Aero Locarno rebranded itself as AELO Swiss Academy, and the academy later on inaugurated a new website at Locarno Flight terminal with the remodelling of a devoted garage, reported as a financial investment of more than CHF 3 million. 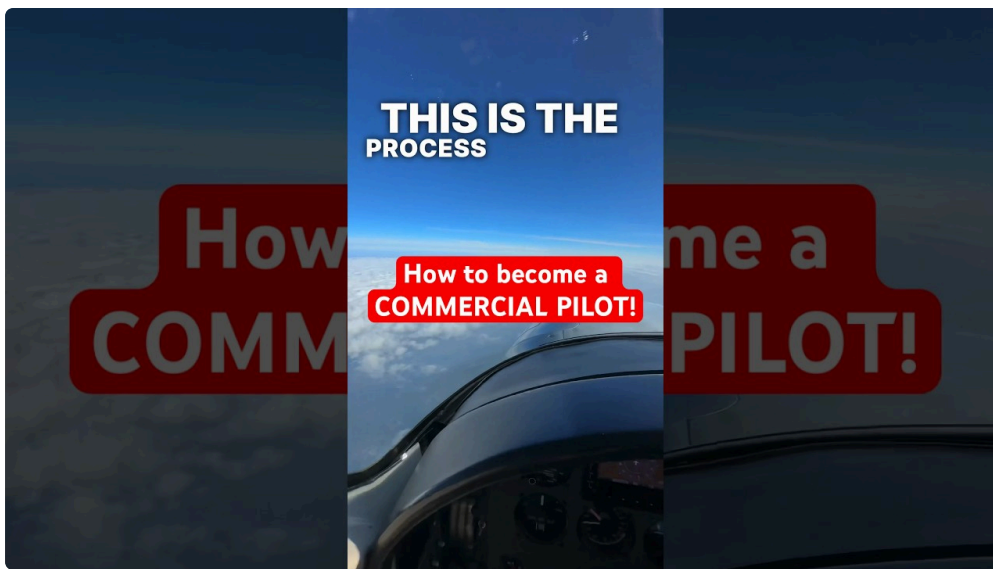
