- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight imperfections, generally near edges)
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear, scratches, or fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint breaking)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Extremely used, sometimes drastically modifying the texture)

Note: Some products look wonderful even in Battle-Scarred condition, while others are prized strictly in Factory New.

2. Product Rarity Tiers

Valve categorizes weapon surfaces into color-coded tiers based on their drop rates in cases or trade-ups.

Patterns and StatTrak™: The Elements of Prestige

Beyond float values and rarities, two significant functions can considerably inflate an item's worth: **Pattern Indexes** and **StatTrak™ technology**.

Pattern Templates

Numerous finishes utilize a procedural generation system where a texture design template crosses the weapon design based upon a "Paint Seed" (from 1 to 1000). Depending upon the seed number, the visual look can alter totally.

- **Case Hardened:** Famous for its blue and gold circulations. A pattern with a high percentage of solid blue on top can command tens of countless dollars.
- **Fade:** Depending on the seed, the shift from yellow to pink to purple can vary, with "100% Fade" variants fetching top dollar.

StatTrak™ Technology

Products geared up with StatTrak™ function a little digital LCD screen attached to the weapon body that tracks the variety of validated kills the owner makes with it. While these items drop at the exact same rate as their non-StatTrak counterparts, they usually command a higher cost tag on the Steam Community Market and third-party trading sites.

How to Acquire Them

3. **Third-Party Trading Platforms:** Websites specializing in peer-to-peer trading allow users to purchase products using genuine fiat currency or crypto, frequently at a 15-- 30% discount rate compared to Steam market costs.
4. **Trade-Ups:** A system where gamers can trade ten products of one rarity tier for one random item of the next higher tier within the exact same collection.
