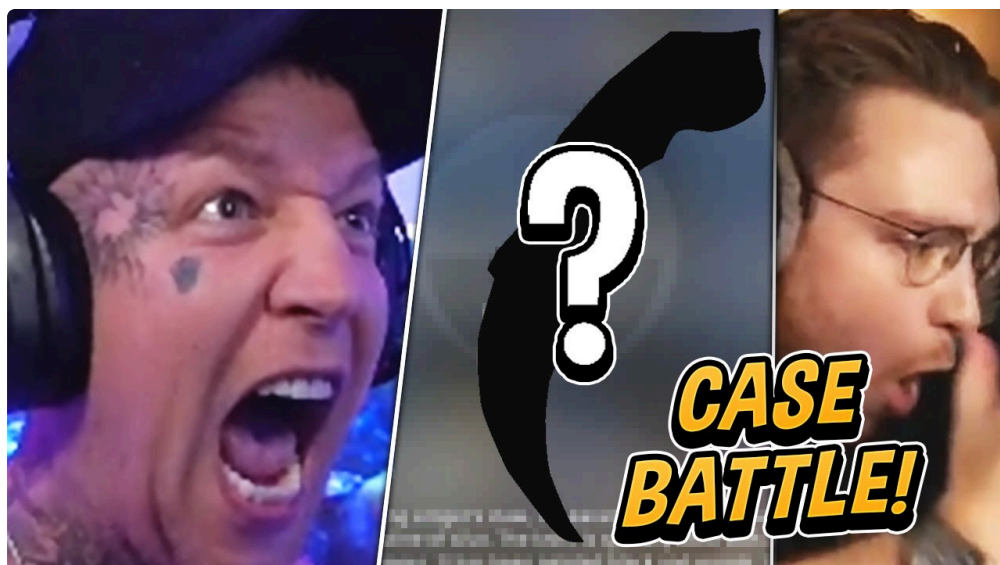
## How Case Battles Work (Step-by-Step)
