

Do you really need monthly pest control in Ottawa?

For many homeowners, a **monthly pest control plan** seems like the safest option, particularly when looking for **pest control Ottawa** as they review service options before a problem gets worse. If you've had pest problems before

If your home has easy entry points

Homes with visible **entry points** often benefit from ongoing service because exclusion takes time. Cracks in foundations, gaps around utilities, unsealed vents, weather stripping problems, and open garage access all make it more likely for pests to enter.

Basements are a major concern in Ottawa, especially in older homes or houses with unfinished lower levels. Since basements are often cool, quiet, and lightly disturbed, they can become ideal harborage areas for rodents and insects. What to search for in a local provider
