The Float Value System

Aside from rarity, every skin is designated a **Float Value** between 0.00 and 1.00. This float dictates the wear condition of the weapon. Even two similar skins may look considerably different depending upon their float worth, which directly impacts their market worth.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, no scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Minor acnes or scratches)
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable wear and tear)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear on paint)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavily degraded, often modifies the look entirely)

2. The Mechanics of Acquisition: How Players Get Skins

Gamers have a few distinct techniques for developing their digital inventories. Some count on sheer luck, while others prefer direct purchasing.

- **Random Drops:** Simply playing on authorities or neighborhood servers grants weekly care packages consisting of weapon drops or graffiti.
- **Opening Cases:** Players can buy or make weapon cases and use a matching "Key" to unlock them. This operates similarly to a lottery game, with low odds of unboxing high-tier products.

- **Trade-Up Contracts:** A function that enables gamers to trade 10 skins of the very same rarity tier for one skin of the next greater tier, providing a method to recycle undesirable products.

- **M4A4|Groan:** The only skin categorized as "Contraband." Valve eliminated it from drop pools due to copyright infringement concerns involving the art work, making existing copies tremendously valuable collector's items.

- **Karambit|Doppler (Ruby/Sapphire/Emerald):** High-end knives including fantastic gem-like finishes that remain status symbols among seasoned gamers.

5. The Transition to Counter-Strike 2 (CS2)

When Valve transitioned the game from CS: GO to **Counter-Strike 2**, fans held their cumulative breath regarding the fate of their stocks. Luckily, Valve verified that **all items rollovered seamlessly** into the brand-new engine.
