

Arlington in Knoxville has a quiet kind of appeal that people often miss on a first pass. It is not trying to perform for visitors, and that is part of the charm. You notice it in the older homes with well-kept porches, the steady rhythm of local traffic, the churches and schools that anchor daily life, and the way neighbors still pay attention to what is happening on their street.
