

Why rodents get into garages in Ottawa

Ottawa homeowners deal with a particular kind of rodent pressure. Ultrasonic repellents are popular, but they seldom deliver reliable long-term control. Rodents may disregard them, adjust to them, or simply go around them. They can be part of a broader plan, but they should not replace exclusion, sanitation, and inspection.

The most dependable method is **rodent sealing** combined with cleanup and selective trapping. That means closing **access gaps**, removing attractants, and then using traps <https://sites.google.com/view/city-of-ottawa-pest-control/> to deal with the animals already inside. This approach is significantly better than relying on repellents alone.
