What is a CS: GO Case?

Rarity Tiers

Products are color-coded based on how unusual they are to pull. The higher the rarity, the lower the drop rate.

Limited	Purple	~ 15.98%	Uncommon, usually better designs.
Categorized	Pink	~ 3.2%	Rare, extremely desired weapon surfaces.

Red ~ 0.64% Extremely unusual, flagship weapon skins. **Special (Exceedingly Rare)** Gold ~ 0.26% Knives or gloves (the supreme prize).

Use Conditions (Float Values)

Aside from rarity, every skin is assigned a **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00, which determines its physical wear and tear.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.44
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.44-- 1.00

Note: Some skins are "wear-capped," suggesting they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower-float variations extremely valuable.

The Mathematics of Opening Cases

It is obvious that the chances are greatly stacked in favor of your home (Valve). While the specific algorithms are proprietary, community-driven information collection involving millions of opened cases has provided us an extremely accurate image of the stats.

- **StatTrak Probability:** For any item dropped, there is a roughly **10% opportunity** that it will include the StatTrak technology, which tracks the number of eliminates made with that weapon.
