1. Validating Integrity of Game Files

4. Click **Verify integrity of game files**.

2. Changing Launch Options

1. Browse to the CS: GO setup folder (usually C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
2. Locate the main executable file (csgo.exe).
3. Right-click the file and choose **Properties**.
4. Go to the **Compatibility** tab.
5. Check the box for **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.
6. Click **Apply** and then **OK**.

4. Solving Third-Party Software Conflicts

Specific background applications routinely disrupt Valve's Anti-Cheat (VAC) and the game client itself. Known culprits consist of:

- Overlays (Discord, GeForce Experience, RivaTuner, MSI Afterburner)
- Custom anti-viruses software application (whitelisting the video game folder typically solves this)
- Outdated peripheral software application (Logitech G Hub, Razer Synapse)

Understanding Common Error Codes

When CS: GO crashes, it often supplies an error message or code. The table below describes what these mistakes imply and how to repair them.

Mistake Message/ Symptom Probable Cause Advised Fix **"Engine Error: Out of Memory"** System RAM or VRAM is exhausted. Validate video game files through Steam, reboot the Steam client, and make sure no unapproved memory editors are running. **Instant Desktop Crash on Startup** Outdated graphics motorists or corrupted setup files. Update GPU chauffeurs, delete the cfg folder to reset settings, or reinstall DirectX runtimes. **Game Freezes, Sound Loops, then Crashes** GPU driver crash or unstable hardware overclock. Advanced Troubleshooting: System-Level Fixes

- **Perform a Clean Boot:** Temporarily disable all non-Microsoft services via msconfig to isolate third-party software application disputes.

Q: What should I do if none of these fixes work?

A: If all else stops working, a total clean reinstall of CS: GO is suggested. Uninstall the video game through Steam, manually delete any remaining folders in the Steam directory site, and carry out a fresh download.
