Step-by-Step Guides for Common DIY Window Fixes

For those eager [Window Replacement](#) to roll up their sleeves, here are three common window repairs that a lot of homeowners can tackle.

1. Replacing Worn Weatherstripping

Drafty windows are typically the result of flattened or missing out on weatherstripping.

- **Action 1:** Clean the window channel completely to remove dirt and old adhesive.
- **Action 2:** Measure the border of the window sash.
- **Action 3:** Cut the brand-new weatherstripping (V-strip, foam tape, or felt) to size.
- **Step 4:** Peel and stick (or staple, depending upon the material) the weatherstripping into place, guaranteeing a tight seal when the window closes.

2. Fixing a Stuck Window

Old paint or humidity can trigger wood windows to stick firmly within their tracks.

- **Step 1:** Run an utility knife carefully around the boundary of the sash to break any paint seals.
- **Action 2:** Tap carefully along the frame with a wood block and a hammer to loosen the window without shattering the glass.
- **Action 3:** Once the window moves, raise it and clean up out any dirt or debris from the tracks.
- **Step 4:** Apply a silicone-based lubricant or paraffin wax to the tracks for smooth future operation.

3. Changing a Cracked Single-Pane Window

If a single pane of glass breaks, it can be replaced without buying an entire brand-new window unit.



- **Action 1:** Put on sturdy work gloves and security glasses. Carefully eliminate all damaged glass fragments from the frame.
- **Action 2:** Scrape away the old glazing putty and eliminate the metal glints holding the glass in location.
- **Step 3:** Measure the opening and cut a brand-new piece of glass (or have a hardware shop sufficed) somewhat smaller than the opening.
- **Step 4:** Apply a fresh bed of glazing putty to the rabbet (the recess where the glass sits).
- **Step 5:** Press the glass firmly into the putty, secure it with new glazing points, and apply a bevel of putty around the exterior edge. Paint once dry.

Preventive Maintenance: How to Make Your Windows Last

The very best window fix is the one you never have to make. Regular upkeep can dramatically extend the life-span of windows:

- **Clean Regularly:** Wipe down tracks, frames, and glass at least two times a year to avoid dirt accumulation that causes jams.

- **Examine Caulking:** Check the outside caulk around the window frames every year. Reapply exterior-grade silicone caulk if gaps or fractures appear.
- **Lube Moving Parts:** Apply a light lube to hinges, locks, and moving tracks when a year.
- **Control Indoor Humidity:** Use dehumidifiers in moist areas like basements to prevent condensation and subsequent wood rot.

1. How much does a professional window fix cost?

4. For how long do windows usually last?

- **Vinyl windows:** 20 to 40 years.
- **Wood windows:** 30 to 50+ years (with appropriate upkeep).
- **Aluminum windows:** 20 to 25 years.
- **Fiberglass windows:** 50+ years.
