stay consistent. 1. Safety First Broken glass is inherently dangerous. Anyone managing the repair must use durable work gloves, protective glasses, and closed-toe shoes. If the glass is completely shattered, setting a tarpaulin or heavy plastic sheeting around the work

glass if the door is removed from its frame and laid flat on a workbench or saw-horses. Unlatch and lift sliding doors out of their tracks.
