The winner's inventory is immediately credited with every single skin dropped in the battle (both their own and their challengers').

Popular Game Modes in Case Battles

- **1v1 Classic:** A direct head-to-head battle. Winner takes all.

- **Tag-Team (2v2):** Two players pool their ratings against another duo. The winning group divides the loot.
