Daily life when the scale is human

Families often ask, "What does an average day appear like here?" They are not just inquiring about activities. They want to know whether their mother will be rushed through early morning care or left to worrying in front of a television for six hours.

In small homes, the rhythm of the day tends to follow citizens rather than a master schedule printed on glossy paper. Breakfast may be drawn out over two hours, with early risers eating very first and late sleepers roaming in when they are ready.
