The Explorer (The Experience Seeker)

This dad might be the one who always talks about traveling to somewhere exotic or mastering a new skill. His hamper should feel like a "starter kit" for his next adventure, even if that adventure is just on the couch. **Ideas to include:**

- A passport holder and travel-sized versions of local delicacies from a place he wants to visit (e.g., Italian olive oil, Jamaican rum).
- A subscription voucher for an online masterclass (cocktail making, woodworking).
- High-quality binoculars or a personalized map print.

This reminds us that the hamper is merely the physical manifestation of your deep thought—it's the container for the memory you want him to keep.
