This single update triggered a huge shockwave in the trading community, completely separating "investable skins" from "practical keys."

Kinds of Keys in Counter-Strike

Not all keys are created [cs2 cases](#) equivalent. Throughout the years, Valve introduced several variations of secrets connected to specific collections or occasions.

1. Standard Case Keys

Bought directly from the in-game store for £ 2.50. These can open the large bulk of basic weapon cases currently dropping in the video game.

2. Operation Keys

Throughout particular operations (like Operation Hydra, Breakout, or Wildfire), Valve launched operation-specific cases alongside devoted operation keys. As soon as the operation ended, these keys typically retained their functionality for their particular cases, ending up being collector's items.

3. Esport Keys

Presented early in CS: GO's life expectancy to help fund prize swimming pools for professional tournaments, Esport secrets opened Esport-specific green, blue, and red cases. These are remarkably uncommon today.
