Outside Wears and Float Values

When a skin drops from a case, it is assigned a random **Float Value** in between 0.00 and 1.00. This float worth determines the exterior condition of the weapon, which drastically impacts its visual look and market price.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Very Little Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FT):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look nearly similar in Field-Tested and Factory New, while others look greatly broken down even at low drifts. Collectors often pay huge premiums for skins with very low (or often absurdly high) float worths.

Active vs. Rare (Discontinued) Case Pools

Valve categorizes cases into two main groups, which straight influences their supply and market cost.

1. The Active Drop Pool

These are cases presently dropping to players actively playing the video game. Since supply is constantly going into the market, these cases are usually cheap (frequently under £ 1.00).

- *Examples:* Kilowatt Case, Recoil Case, Dreams & Nightmares Case.

2. The Rare (Discontinued) Drop Pool
