How the CS2 Gambling Ecosystem Works

1. Steam API and Peer-to-Peer (P2P) Trading

- **Addiction and Mental Health:** The gamified nature of opening digital cases and chasing losses can trigger compulsive gambling behaviors, especially amongst more youthful audiences who form the core demographic of CS2.
