- **Pro Player Popularity:** If a popular esports expert uses a particular skin throughout a Major tournament, demand for that skin generally increases overnight.
- **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten skins of the exact same rarity for one skin of the next higher tier, producing a steady demand for lower-tier products.
