- **Save “first-night” essentials until last.** I keep a running list for these, including items like coffee makers, chargers, basic toiletries, and a couple sets of clothes. This helps avoid the “triage” failure mode where you scramble post-move to find basics.
- **Use sturdy boxes and avoid overpacking.** This minimizes drift or damage during the move.

1. **Label by room and contents.** Use big, clear labels that movers can see at a glance.
2. **Number boxes and keep a master inventory.** For example, "Kitchen-Box 3 of 6." This helps with accountability and unpacking.
3. **Stage boxes near the doorway or the spot reserved for the movers to enter.** This reduces time wasted fetching boxes from distant rooms.

When combined, these steps reduce the chance of mishandled items and improve the movers' workflow—key for keeping on schedule and budget.

Timeline Flexibility Vs Fixed Deadlines: How Does This Affect the Week Before Your Move?
