

Getting Around Hempstead: Which Transit Choices Are Available?

Hempstead is a major village in Nassau County with its own Long Island Rail Road station and direct commuter access, which makes **public transportation** a convenient part of everyday life here. Whether you are heading to work, class, a medical appointment, or a day out in central Nassau County, the local mix of rail and bus service gives you several dependable **transit options**.

The two main systems to know are the **Hempstead LIRR Station** and the **Nassau Inter-County Express (NICE Bus)**. Together, they shape most **local transit** and **commuter travel** patterns in and around **Downtown Hempstead**. 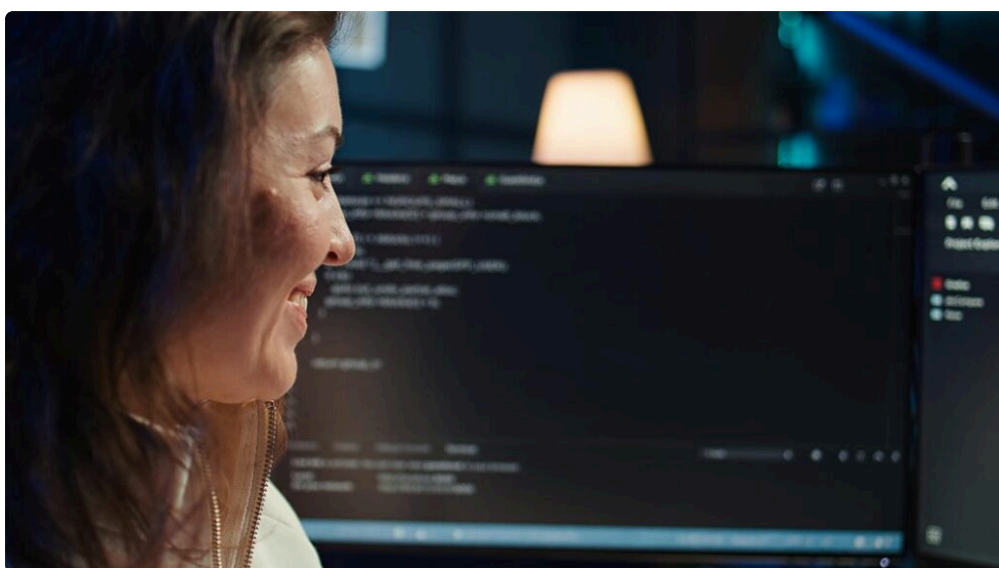
