He didn't just get tools; he got validation for a passion most people found baffling.

This effort acts like an emotional **magnifying glass**, focusing all your love onto one specific point of interest. When you approach gifting this way, you are asking yourself: *What is the thing I know about him that no one else does?*

## Unlocking His Hidden Passions and Niche Interests
