Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing recurring crashes, overcome the following troubleshooting steps methodically.

1. Confirm the Integrity of Game Files

Over time, game files can end up being damaged due to unforeseen system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or malfunctioning storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to check and replace missing out on or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and select **Properties**.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

3. Change Launch Options

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and select **Properties**.

5. Check for Background Application Interference

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party anti-viruses software (try adding an exclusion for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If basic fixes stop working to deal with the problem, the issue might lie much deeper within your operating system or hardware configuration.

1. Managing Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM provides an efficiency increase, CS: GO is notoriously sensitive to hardware instability.

- If you have used an aggressive overclock, attempt dialing it back to standard factory specifications.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is triggering the crashes.

2. Reinstalling CS: GO Cleanly

Often, leftover custom-made maps, out-of-date workshop products, or heavily customized configuration files trigger consistent disputes.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- By hand navigate to the setup directory site (... steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and delete any remaining folders.
- Reinstall a fresh copy of the game.
