

Merrick does not try too hard to impress you, and that is part of the appeal. It sits on Long Island's South Shore with the calm confidence of a place that knows what it is: a residential community with good schools, sturdy neighborhoods, easy access to the water, and enough local character to reward a thoughtful visit. People usually come through Merrick for a family gathering, a day on the South Shore, a restaurant stop, or because they are exploring Nassau County beyond the better-known names.
