Outside Wear and Float Values

Unpacking a skin is just half the battle. Every weapon dropped from a case is appointed a **Float Value**-- a number in between 0.00 and 1.00 that determines the physical wear and tear of the weapon.

The exterior conditions are classified into five unique tiers:

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00

Some skins look pristine even at greater float values, while others look greatly damaged. Additionally, certain high-tier knives and weapon patterns are greatly influenced by "Pattern Templates," making specific variations exceptionally uncommon and important to collectors.
