



For many New Jersey homeowners, the garage door is not a minor convenience. It is the largest moving part of the house, a daily access point, a security barrier, and in many cases a shield against weather that can turn rough fast. When that door sticks halfway in January, slams shut in August, or starts grinding the week a family leaves for vacation, the problem feels immediate. It affects schedules, safety, and peace of mind all at once.
