Beyond exterior wear, skins can likewise possess a **StatTrak™** module (which tracks validated kills with that particular weapon, marked by a little digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped throughout main Valve-sponsored esports competitions, including gold team and occasion stickers).
