*Note: There is also roughly a 10% chance that any dropped item will feature **StatTrak**™ technology, which tracks the number of kills made with that weapon.*



How to Acquire CS2 Case Keys

For gamers seeking to dive into unboxing, there are two primary methods to get secrets, each with distinct advantages and disadvantages.

- **In-Game Store (Direct Purchase)**

- *Cost:* ~ £ 2.50 GBP (differs somewhat by regional currency).
- *Pros:* Always available, straight from Valve, completely safe.
- *Cons:* Non-tradable and non-marketable.

- **Steam Community Market (Older/Specific Keys)**

- *Cost:* Varies based upon supply and need.
