

Bellevue has a way of surprising people. Visitors often arrive expecting a polished Eastside business city, all glass towers and efficient roads, then discover a place with real depth beneath the clean edges. The skyline is visible, yes, but so are cherry trees on residential streets, old-growth pockets near creeks, international grocery stores tucked into unassuming strip malls, and parks where you can hear woodpeckers before you hear traffic. That mix, corporate and residential, global and quietly local, is what gives Bellevue its character.

That layered history also shows in the people who live here.
