For example, if this same three bedroom house with six residents had a garbage disposal and was generally producing a higher volume of wastewater, the pumping frequency would be calculated as follows: $1.3 \text{ years} - [(0.2) \times 1.3 \text{ years}] = 1.0 \text{ year}$.
