Examining the Damage: Can It Be Repaired or Replaced?

Security must always be the top priority when dealing with damaged glass. Before attempting any repairs or working with an expert, house owners ought to take instant steps to secure the area:

1. **Clear the Area:** Keep kids and pets away from the room.
2. **Use Protective Gear:** Put on thick work gloves and safety glasses.

3. **Eliminate Loose Glass:** Carefully take out any precariously loose fragments from the frame. Do not require glass that is stuck securely, as this can cause it to shatter even more.
4. **Cover the Opening:** Use heavy-duty plastic sheeting or a thick trash bag, protected with duct tape or painter's tape, to seal the opening from wind, rain, and trespassers.

- **Step 1: Measurement and Ordering:** Accurate measurements of the opening are taken to ensure the new glass fits snugly with a small growth gap.
- **Action 2: Removing the Sash:** If possible, the window sash is gotten rid of from the frame and laid flat on a workbench for simpler handling.
- **Step 3: Stripping Old Glazing and Points:** Old putty (glazing compound) and metal glazier's points (which hold the glass in location) are scraped away utilizing a putty knife or heat weapon.
- **Step 4: Cleaning the Rabbet:** The recess where the glass sits (the rabbet) is thoroughly cleaned up and covered with linseed oil or primer to avoid the wood from drawing wetness out of the new putty.
- **Step 5: Setting the Glass:** A thin bed of glazing putty is laid down, the new glass is pushed gently into location, and glazier's points are driven in to protect it.
- **Action 6: Applying the Final Seal:** A neat triangle of putty is used around the perimeter of the glass, smoothed out, and left to cure before painting.
