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What are cabinet pests and how do they enter Brampton homes?

Cabinet pests are **stored product pests** that consume shelf-stable foods kept in cupboards, cupboards, drawers, and utility spaces. The most common pantry pests in Ontario kitchens include **Indian meal moths**, **flour beetles**, **weevils**, and **grain beetles**. Each one acts a little differently, but all of them attack stored foods and can cause ruined food and recurring clean-up if not handled correctly.

Indian meal moths are some of the easiest to spot because the adults are small moths that may fly around the kitchen or rest on walls and ceilings. Their larvae often feed inside cereal, flour, nuts, dried fruit, and pet food. Webbing is a clear indicator when the infestation is more advanced.

Flour beetles are tiny, reddish-brown beetles that travel through baking supplies and dry mixes. **Weevils** are often found in grains and rice, and they may appear as small beetles with a distinct snout. **Grain beetles** are also interested in pantry staples and can multiply rapidly between boxes and bags stored nearby. These pests are annoying because they can be hidden inside **infested dry goods** before you ever see the insect itself.
