2. Wear Conditions (Float Values)

Every skin is appointed a Float Value ranging from 0.00 to 1.00, which identifies its physical wear and tear. This system makes sure that no 2 skins look completely similar.

- **Factory New (FN):** 0.00-- 0.07 (Pristine, minimal scratches)
- **Minimal Wear (MW):** 0.07-- 0.15 (Slight blemishes, minor wear on edges)
- **Field-Tested (FEET):** 0.15-- 0.38 (Noticeable scratches and fading)
- **Well-Worn (WW):** 0.38-- 0.45 (Significant wear, paint missing in crucial locations)
- **Battle-Scarred (BS):** 0.45-- 1.00 (Heavily worn down, in some cases altering the skin's look entirely)

Note: Some skins are "capped," implying they can not drop in Factory New condition, making lower float variants exceptionally unusual and important.

The Virtual Economy: Why Are Skins So Expensive?

To an outsider, spending hundreds-- or even thousands-- of dollars on a digital knife or rifle texture sounds unreasonable. However, the CS: GO skin economy runs just like the real-world stock exchange or art market. Numerous economic principles drive these prices:

Supply and Demand

Liquidity and Real-World Value

Unlike conventional games where in-game purchases are locked to your account, CS: GO skins can be traded, offered, and converted into genuine currency by means of reliable third-party platforms. This liquidity changes skins from simple cosmetic products into speculative financial properties.
