Beyond outside wear, skins can likewise possess a **StatTrak™** module (which tracks confirmed kills with that particular weapon, marked by a little digital counter) or be designated as **Souvenirs** (dropped during main Valve-sponsored esports competitions, featuring gold group and event sticker labels).

4. **Float Extremes:** Some collectors pay massive premiums for products with very low float worths (e.g., 0.000 x) or extremely high drifts where the gun looks completely rusted away (referred to as "Blackiimovs" on the AWP Asiimov).

While players can purchase and offer items straight on the main **Steam Community Market**, funds are locked within the Steam community and can not be squandered to a savings account. Consequently, a robust third-party ecosystem has emerged.
