Step-by-Step Troubleshooting Guide

If you are experiencing repeating crashes, work through the following troubleshooting actions systematically.

1. Verify the Integrity of Game Files

Gradually, game files can become corrupted due to unforeseen system shutdowns, insufficient updates, or defective storage drives. Steam has a built-in tool to check and change missing or broken files.

- Open the **Steam Library**.
- Right-click on **CS: GO** and choose **Properties**.
- Browse to the **Local Files** tab.
- Click **Verify Integrity of Game Files**.
- Await the process to surface (Steam will automatically download any corrupted files), then restart your computer.

2. Update or Roll Back Graphics Drivers

Your graphics card driver is the bridge in between your hardware and CS: GO. Outdated or corrupted motorists are a main source of video game instability.

- **NVIDIA Users:** Open GeForce Experience or check out the main NVIDIA website to download the most recent Game Ready Driver.
- **AMD Users:** Use the AMD Software: Adrenalin Edition to examine for updates.
- *Pro Tip:* If the crashes started instantly after a motorist update, utilize a tool like **Display Driver Uninstaller (DDU)** in Safe Mode to completely wipe the old driver before setting up a steady, older variation.

3. Adjust Launch Options

Specific launch options can force CS: GO to run in a more steady environment, bypassing introduction videos or forcing particular DirectX modes.

- Go to your Steam Library, right-click **CS: GO**, and choose **Properties**.
- Under the **General** tab, search for **Launch Options**.
- Get in the following recommended steady commands (separated by areas):
 - -novid (Skips the intro video, decreasing load-time crashes)
 - -high (Sets CS: GO to high CPU top priority)
 - -autoconfig (Resets video and performance settings to default if the game declines to launch)

4. Run the Game as Administrator

- Browse to your CS: GO installation folder (usually C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
- Locate the main executable file (csgo.exe).
- Right-click the file and select **Properties**.
- Go to the **Compatibility** tab and check **Run this program as an administrator**.
- Click Apply and OK.

5. Inspect for Background Application Interference

Overlay software application and hardware tracking tools frequently hook into the DirectX pipeline of video games, which can cause sudden crashes. Attempt disabling the following applications while playing:

- Discord Overlay
- NVIDIA GeForce Experience Overlay
- RivaTuner Statistics Server (RTSS) and MSI Afterburner
- Third-party anti-viruses software (attempt including an exclusion for the Steam folder)

Advanced Troubleshooting

If fundamental repairs stop working to fix the issue, the issue may lie deeper within your os or hardware setup.

1. Handling Overclocks and XMP Profiles

While overclocking your CPU, GPU, or RAM supplies a performance increase, CS: GO is infamously conscious hardware instability.

- If you have used an aggressive overclock, try calling it back to baseline factory specifications.
- If you are running high-speed RAM, test disabling your motherboard's **XMP (Extreme Memory Profile)** or **DOCP** in the BIOS to see if memory instability is causing the crashes.

2. Re-installing CS: GO Cleanly

Sometimes, leftover customized maps, out-of-date workshop items, or heavily modified setup files cause relentless disputes.

- Uninstall CS: GO through Steam.
- Manually browse to the setup directory site (... steamapps \ typical \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive) and delete any staying folders.
- Reinstall a fresh copy of the video game.

Preventative Maintenance Checklist

- **Keep Windows Updated:** Install the most recent cumulative updates for your os.

- **Clear DirectX Shader Cache:** Periodically clear your GPU's shader cache through the NVIDIA/AMD control board to prevent rendering errors.
- **Clean Your PC:** Dust buildup can trigger thermal throttling, causing system freezes and crashes. Clean your hardware elements every couple of months.
