- **Active Drop Pool:** Cases currently dropping to players actively playing the game.
- **Uncommon (Discontinued) Drop Pool:** Older cases that no longer drop routinely to active gamers. They drop at an exceptionally low rate (approximated under 1% chance per drop) to a small portion of gamers weekly.
