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A healthy septic system is a quiet partner. When it works, you barely think of it. When it stops working, you think of little else. A backup on a vacation weekend, a soaked spot over the drain field, a whiff of sulfur near the tank cover, these issues bring real expenses and a reasonable quantity of tension.
