Crazy Mode (Reverse) 2+ Players The player who accumulates the *most affordable* overall value at the end wins the whole pot. Players who wish to make fun of getting bad drops.

Top Platforms Hosting Case Battles

Since Valve's main Steam market does not support case battles, players rely on respectable third-party websites. These platforms operate by enabling users to deposit skins or crypto, transform them to site balance, and enter lobbies.

- **Hellcase:** One of the industry pioneers, offering custom-designed cases, daily rewards, and smooth 1vX case battle lobbies.
