- **Play 1v1s for Higher Win Probability:** Statistically, a 1v1 gives you a 50% possibility to win, whereas a 4-player free-for-all drops your odds to 25%. If your goal is to grind and sustain a balance, stay with head-to-head matches.
- **See the Meta and Case Odds:** Research which cases offer the very best distribution of "safe" mid-tier skins versus high-risk knives. Some custom-made cases on field of honor are weighted in a different way than basic Valve cases.

Dangers and Safety Considerations
