

Tequesta has a way of surprising people. On a map, it can look like a small village tucked between better-known coastal destinations in northern Palm Beach County, but once you spend time there, the place begins to reveal its own rhythm. The streets feel lived in, not staged. The parks are used by locals who know the best shade, the quietest trails, and the right time of day to catch a breeze off the water. The community events are small enough to feel personal, yet steady enough to give the village a real civic pulse.

That combination of history, outdoor access, and neighborly energy is what gives Tequesta its character. It is not trying to be a sprawling resort town, and that restraint is part of the appeal.
