- **Round Handicap:** Betting on a team to cover a spread of rounds (e.g., -3.5), suggesting they must win the map by at least 4 rounds.

4. Totals (Over/Under)

This market concentrates on the total variety of rounds played in a map or the overall variety of maps played in a series.

- **Over/Under Maps:** Betting whether a series will end in 2 maps (Under 2.5) or go to a 3rd map (Over 2.5).
- **Over/Under Rounds:** Predicting whether the map will be a blowout (Under 26.5) or a long, drawn-out affair (Over 26.5).

Specialized and Advanced Betting Options

Map-Specific Props

Some platforms enable gamblers to bet on:

- Which team will secure the very first kill (First Blood).
- Which team will reach 5/10/15 rounds initially.
- Whether the map will enter into Overtime.

Competition Outrights

This includes banking on the ultimate winner of a major occasion, such as a PGL Major or an Intel Extreme Masters (IEM) tournament. While these bets can take days or weeks to deal with, they use considerable chances compared to specific match-winners.
