- Specialized equipment for long-haul transport

When Long-Distance is Worth the Premium

Are local movers insured for my belongings?

You can usually purchase additional coverage or use your homeowner's/renter's insurance for moves. Always ask about coverage limits and options before booking.

Should I tip my movers, and how much?
