

Amityville is the kind of Long Island village that reveals itself in layers. At first glance, it can look like a compact South Shore community shaped by commuting patterns, marinas, and older residential streets. Spend more time here, though, and the place opens up. Its history runs deeper than the headlines most people recognize, its waterfront has long influenced local life, and the village still carries the marks of different eras in the homes, churches, civic buildings, and small businesses that line its streets.

What makes Amityville especially interesting is the way it balances memory and routine.
