For non-EU/EEA license holders (e.g., USA, India, UK post-Brexit, Ukraine), the rules are more stringent:

- Licenses from nations that signed the **1968 Vienna Convention on Road Traffic** can normally be exchanged directly, though tests might be required depending upon bilateral arrangements and residency period.
- Licenses from countries under the **1949 Geneva Convention** typically require passing the theoretical state exam.
