Rarity Tiers and Drop Mechanics

Valve arranges weapon finishes into unique rarity tiers, normally communicated through color-coding. The drop rate reduces substantially as the tier increases, straight affecting market price.

Rarity Tier Color Code Description Approximate Drop/Unbox Probability **Customer Grade** White Common, fundamental weapon surfaces. Found via weekly drops/ default. **Industrial Grade** Light Blue Somewhat better than customer grade. Common weekly drops. **Mil-Spec** Blue Standard weapon skin tier. ~ 79.92% (from cases)

Restricted Purple Above typical quality. ~ 15.98% (from cases) **Classified** Pink High-tier skins, extremely looked for after. ~ 3.20% (from cases) **Covert** Red The greatest standard tier for weapons. ~ 0.64% (from cases) **Exceedingly Rare** Gold Knives and Special Wearable Gloves. ~ 0.26% (from cases)

Beyond standard wear ratings, some skins include a **StatTrak™** innovation module, which physically engraves kill counts onto the side of the weapon. StatTrak versions typically command a greater price than their non-StatTrak counterparts. Furthermore, specific patterns (like the famous "Case Hardened" blue gems) rely on a pattern index that can make a specific skin totally unique and worth tens of thousands of dollars.

The Economics of Counter-Strike

What makes the CS: GO/CS2 skin environment remarkable is its decentralized, player-driven economy. Unlike games where microtransactions are locked to an account, Valve created a system where virtual items have real-world liquidity.

Skins can be traded peer-to-peer, purchased and sold on the Steam Community Market, or exchanged through third-party marketplaces utilizing real currency (cryptocurrency, bank transfers, or PayPal).

Elements Driving Skin Prices:

1. **Supply and Demand:** Older cases that no longer drop in-game ended up being scarce over time, driving up the price of both the cases and the skins inside them.
2. **Pro Player Influence:** When a popular esports gamer (like s1mple or ZywOo) uses a specific skin during a major competition, demand for that skin often surges overnight.
3. **Trade-Up Contracts:** Players can trade in ten skins of one rarity to receive one random skin of the next greater rarity, successfully destroying the input skins and decreasing overall supply.
4. **Visual appeals and Trends:** Vibrant, colorful skins (like the "Fade" or "Neo-Noir" lines) generally outperform dull or monochromatic styles in appeal.
