1. Verifying Integrity of Game Files

2. Changing Launch Options

1. Browse to the CS: GO setup folder (generally C: \ Program Files (x86)\ Steam \ steamapps \ common \ Counter-Strike Global Offensive).
2. Locate the main executable file (csgo.exe).
3. Right-click the file and choose **Properties**.
4. Go to the **Compatibility** tab.
5. Check package for **Disable fullscreen optimizations**.
6. Click **Apply** and then **OK**.

4. Resolving Third-Party Software Conflicts

Certain background applications routinely disrupt Valve's Anti-Cheat (VAC) and the game customer itself. Understood offenders include:

- Overlays (Discord, GeForce Experience, RivaTuner, MSI Afterburner)
- Custom anti-viruses software application (whitelisting the game folder often solves this)
- Outdated peripheral software application (Logitech G Hub, Razer Synapse)

Understanding Common Error Codes

Update GPU drivers, delete the cfg folder to reset settings, or reinstall DirectX runtimes. **Video Game Freezes, Sound Loops, then Crashes** GPU chauffeur crash or unsteady hardware overclock. Go back any factory or user overclocks on the GPU/CPU and perform a tidy installation of graphics motorists utilizing
