- **Prize:** Multiple gamers drop skins into a main pot. Each skin adds to the player's overall "ticket" weight. A random draw selects a winner, meaning players who transfer more have a greater statistical possibility of winning the entire pot.
- **Case Opening:** Simulates the in-game case opening experience however often with considerably better (or at least transparently mentioned) chances than the main Valve cases.

- **Underage Gambling:** Due to the casual integration with Steam-- a platform used by millions of minors-- enforcing stringent age verification has traditionally been a difficulty for third-party operators.

Finest Practices for Safe Navigation
