- **The Martingale System:** A traditional progressive wagering method where a player doubles their bet after every loss, attempting to recuperate all previous losses plus an earnings when they finally win. This requires an enormous bankroll and frequently hits table or site limits during a losing streak.
- **The Anti-Martingale (Paroli) System:** Players double their bets after a *win* rather than a loss, attempting to profit from winning streaks while minimizing damage during cold runs.
- **High-Risk Hunting:** Waiting for extended streaks of low crashes (e.g., several rounds under 1.50 x) and betting high on a perceived "high multiplier" coming soon. (Note: This falls victim to the Gambler's Fallacy; every round is an independent occasion).
